Los Angeles Styles Aid Wild Horse Slaughter in the Western States
Phoenix, Ariz., July 13 [1929] – Although more than 8,000 wild horses were slaughtered within the year, the Arizona Industrial congress estimates there are nearly a half million wild horses still at large in the state.

The feed the animals consume is needed for cattle and sheep. It is claimed that two horses eat as much as three cows and their calves. The wild horses are used primarily in the manufacture of poultry scrap, canned dog food, fish food and recent inquiries have been received for horse meat for export to Holland . A demand for young hides has developed from Los Angeles , where they are made into ladies' coats.

Fifteen thousand head will be put through the reduction works this year.

How long will it take to answer my request?

Federal agencies are required to answer your request for information within 20-working days of receipt of your request at the office responsible for the records (excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays). For FOIA request received by e-mail, the "receipt" date is considered the date the e-mail message is opened by the Bureau responsible for the information. Sometimes an agency may need more than 20-working days to find the records, examine them, possibly consult with other persons or agencies, and decide whether it will disclose the records requested. If so, the agency is required to inform you before the deadline. Agencies have the right to extend this period up to 10 more working days.

Q: Are wild horses responsible for overgrazing on public lands?

A: The main cause of degradation of public lands is livestock use, not wild horses. Cows graze within a mile of water, while wild horses are highly mobile, grazing from five to ten miles from water, at higher elevations, on steeper slopes, and in more rugged terrain. A congressionally-mandated study by the National Academy of Sciences found that, in one year, livestock consumed 70% of grazing resources on public lands, while wild horses and burros consumed less than 5%. Q: Is it true that wild horse herds double in size every five years and have no natural predators?

A: In its 1982 study, the National Academy of Sciences found "annual rates of increase of 10% or less" in wild horse populations, a far cry from the 20% increase relied upon by the BLM to justify its removal program. Wild horses do have predators, in the form of mountain lions and bears. In 2004 for instance, only 1 out of 28 foals survived in Montana's Pryor Mountain area. Such low survival rate was mostly due to mountain lion predation.
