Emergency Wild Horse Roundup Scheduled

The U-S Bureau of Land Management has announced plans to conduct an emergency roundup of more than 200 wild horses from wildfire-ravaged areas of eastern Nevada.

BLM officials say the roundup expected to start Sunday in portions of Lincoln and White Pine counties is necessary because of wildfires that destroyed forage for the animals.

Officials plan to gather 190 wild horses from the Dry Lake, Highland Peak and Rattlesnake Herd Management Areas, and up to 25 wild horses from the Seaman and Clover HMAs.

The roundup will leave about 160 wild horses in the latter HMAs and 80 horses in the other HMA's.

The horses will be taken to the National Wild Horse and Burro Center in Polomino Valley near Reno, where they will be prepared for adoption.

The two counties reported 46 wildfires this year.

**"Wild horses and burros up for adoption in Woodside"** (BLM California news release, 9/5/03)

At this event Saturday and Sunday, the BLM will offer approximately 80 wild horses and 20 wild burros for public for adoption. The majority of the wild horses are from the Carter Reservoir herd management area along the California-Nevada border east of Cedarville, Calif. These wild horses are known for their size, conformation, and color.

Horses to be Removed in Millard County

FILLMORE, Utah (AP) -- The Bureau of Land Management will begin removing wild horses from the Swasey Herd Management Area in mid-July. The Swasey HMA is on the Swasey Mountains in north central Millard County, about 30 miles west of Delta.

The removal will involve about 250 wild horses that are roaming the area.

Officials say the Swasey HMA can only handle between 60 and 100 horses. That means that 150 or more horses will need to be removed from the area, which is about 120,000 acres.

Many of the horses in the Swasey Herd are descendants of horses that were turned loose or escaped from local ranches. The Swasey herd is dominated by gray and light colored horses. The herd also has some black, brown and bay horses.

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
